# **Message from the President**

C ince 1997 we - the SXTA First Nations - have knuckled down and moved milestone  $\bigvee$  to milestone down our strategic pathway through Stage 4 of the treaty process. Our immediate aim is to finish our Agreement in Principle (AiP).

This stage of negotiations carries with it the greatest bulk of work in the treaty process. The majority of our substantive issues are negotiated in this phase - including governance. As if we were building ourselves a new house, AiP is the phase where we put in place most of our foundation, roof, posts and beams. In achieving AiP we will be able to develop what our 'house' looks like, rather than having to see it through a veil as we have for all these years.

This year we added substantially to these plans. We are within reach of our AiP. We are nearly there. The SXTA took major steps to complete our draft Agreement, one of two major parts of our AiP.

We also worked hard, collectively, putting our heads together as leadership to address challenging issues in developing a Land and Cash Proposal. This Winter we put forward our SXTA Land and Cash Proposal to government as the other major piece of work needed to move ahead with our AiP.

Our position as a lead table in BC was evident in the attention and resourcing that the government provided to us this year. The Ministry of Aboriginal Relations and Reconciliation has our Land and Cash Mandate in the cue as a highest priority for BC Cabinet approval, pending the return of normal business among the BC Legislature following the recent election.

# Introduction

n the 2016-17 fiscal year, the L Stó:lō Xwexwilmexw Treaty Association (SXTA) continued working ambitiously toward achieving the objectives laid out in the Tripartite Work Plan as critical steps along the path to completion of the Agreement in Principle (AiP).

This report focuses on summarizing the SXTA's activities and efforts developing their treaty throughout the 2016-17 fiscal year.

Substantial treaty-based activities occurred at all levels, including tripartite work at the Stó:lo Xwexwilmexw Treaty Table (SXTT) and Lands Technical Working Group (LTWG), and internally within the SXTA Executive, SXTA Leadership and Working Group(s), the Treaty Negotiating Team, and the

SXTA Treaty Outreach Team.

A detailed accounting of the monthly schedule of meetings is included on page 11. Substantive issues addressed in negotiations are outlined below and in the updated 'Rolling Draft'.

Substantive activity and progress at the treaty table in the fiscal year is accounted for in the Main Table Records of Decision.

# Conclusion

t the conclusion of the 2016-17 fiscal year, the Stó:lō Xwexwilmexw Treaty Association (SXTA) remains actively and aggressively working to complete Stage 4 of the B.C. Treaty Process.

The SXTA's activities continue to be fueled by a mandate from the SXTA First Nations and community members to achieve a Land and Cash Offer from BC/Canada as well as tangible results from the BC Treaty Process. The SXTA took significant initiative this year, achieving major milestones of progress working toward an Agreement-in-Principle (AiP), including:







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• Effective completion of all chapters required for the AiP;

• Completion of the final phase of land status analysis on the SXTA's lands of interest for Treaty Settlement Lands (TSL);



 Completion and submission of the SXTA-based TSL scenario;

• Establishment of a foundation for a provincial land/cash offer mandate - now pending post-election approval from the BC Cabinet;

• Implementation of Engagement over Treaty and TSL interests

with non-SXTA First Nations.

The Tri-Partite Annual Work Plan for 2016-17, submitted to the B.C. Treaty Commission in March of 2016, builds on these milestones and provides the projected objectives, issues and schedule of internal and external treaty activities for the upcoming fiscal year.

A significant focus of 2017-2018 year will be the achievement of a Chief Negotiators' Letter of Understanding as a major milestone to AiP completion. The SXTA remains committed to the process of treaty-making with the ultimate intent of making things better for their future generations.

# Main Table Activity: Substantive Issues

The Parties engaged in 25 days I of tripartite activities including Main Table and Lands Technical Working Group meetings between April 1, 2016 and March 31, 2017. The *Record of Activity* and Record of Decisions and Actions is updated throughout the year.

### n the 2016-17 fiscal year, the SXTA's treaty operations included six core interrelated and interconnected bodies and areas of activity, all of which were active throughout the year. These include:

### Stó:lō Xwexwilmexw Treaty Associa-

tion (SXTA) -- the leadership of the treaty association providing strategic direction on all treaty operations, represented by the Chief and Council of seven Stó:lo First Nations -- Aitchelitz, Leq'á:mel, Popkum, Skawahlook, Skowkale, Tzeachten, and Yakweakwioose.

Popkum First Nation provided a statement to the BC Treaty Commission (BCTC) indicating their withdrawal from the treaty process. Popkum First Nation was removed from the SXTA, following societal procedures, at the March 22, 2017 SXTA Business Meeting.

The Technical Advisor of the TNT provides general management for the SXTA treaty operations.

The TNT reports to and takes direction from the SXTA.

SXTA Working Groups (WG) – advisory groups formed by members of the SXTA, or appointed representatives, community members, and researchers/consultants serving to inform the development of positions and content of chapters being negotiated or in preparation for discussion at the Main Table (e.g., Lands; Governance).

SXTA Working Groups continued their work on aspects of governance and lands.

The WG developed a framework for the SXTA Constitution. The WG also acted as the project Steering Committee for the SXTA's Treaty Related Measures projects.

WGs are facilitated by the Technical Advisor or other members of the TNT.

The Outreach Team produces and distributes a bi-monthly SXTA treaty bulletin. Throughout the year, the Liaisons host numerous one-on-one and family-based discussions with community members about current treaty issues.

They regularly meet with community members, providing information and gathering feedback from the membership of the SXTA First Nations.

They also help organize and facilitate a variety of broad-based treaty forums including Community and Youth Forums, and Place Names tours.

### **Operational Support Staff & Con-**

sultants – All aspects of SXTA operations are supported by staff of the Stó:lo Research and Resource Management Centre.

Under the direction of the General Manager for Treaty Operations, staff assists in meeting the objectives of the treaty table and SXTA's internal mandates.

Staff includes experts and technicians with expertise in Geographic Information Systems (GIS) and database management, cultural heritage and history, genealogy, library and archives management, research, land use and environmental planning, negotiation, outreach, and finance and administration.

Substantial areas of work include involvement on the tripartite Lands Technical Working Group addressing land-related issues such as land status, cultural sites protec-

> tion, commonage reserves.

Abby Duncan provides administrative support for the SXTA under the direction of the SXTA Executive.
